Pathways, Subject Selection

Accelerated learning in Year 10 and 11

Senior high school and subject selection are an exciting time when you get to specialise a bit more by narrowing down the subjects you're studying again. Accelerated learning is another area that might also be worth exploring. It's when you get the chance to study a subject units ahead of the year level they're generally designed to be studied in; allowing you to complete some senior subjects before Year 12.

In this blog, we'll explain what subject acceleration actually means, help you work out if it might suit you, and show you where to find the details for your state or territory.

What is subject acceleration?

Subject acceleration means studying course content earlier than most students your age. For example, a year 10 student might start a senior subject that's usually taught in year 11. It's different to just doing harder work in your normal class, which is called extension. Acceleration means moving ahead in the timeline, not just doing more difficult tasks at your current level. Every state and territory in Australia has its own rules about how acceleration works, and schools usually need to approve it first. It's never something you can just sign up for on your own. A teacher, year coordinator, or careers advisor will usually be involved in the decision, along with your parents or carers, so they should be your first port of call to find out more and start discussions.

Who tends to benefit from acceleration?

Acceleration could suit you if you have already mastered most of the year level content and are asking for more. If you're regularly finishing work early, feeling bored in class, or seeking out extra challenges outside school, it might be worth exploring. Or, if you're considering studying the maximum number of subjects in senior high school and would like to spread the work load. Students who are strong, independent learners and who manage their time well often cope best with the faster pace.

It's also worth thinking about your motivation. Are you keen to accelerate because you genuinely love the subject and want to go deeper? Or is it because you feel you should, or because a friend is doing it? Acceleration works best when it's driven by curiosity and confidence, not by comparison or pressure.

When it's better to hold back

Not every capable student wants or needs to accelerate, and that's completely fine. You might learn best by exploring a subject in more depth at your own year level, rather than rushing ahead. In which case asking for extension work or just dedicating extra study time to those subjects might suit you better. Even if you are very strong academically and ready for the Year 11 and 12 units, if you're not always comfortable being in different environments or being out of your comfort zone, then accelerating subjects (especially if you have to go into other year levels to complete the learning) could be worth exploring further before committing.

There's no prize for getting there first. If accelerating would mean giving up subjects or extra curricular activities you enjoy, missing out on friendships in your year group, or would cause you

lots of stress, it might not be worth it. Doing well and feeling good about your learning matters just as much as moving quickly through it.

This is exactly why it helps to talk to the adults around you before making a decision. Your teachers and careers advisors know the acceleration process at your school, and they can help you weigh up whether it fits your goals, your workload, and your wellbeing. They've seen many students go through this process before, so their advice is worth listening to.

How acceleration affects subject selection

If you're considering acceleration, it's worth thinking about how it fits into your overall subject selection, not just for this year, but right through to your senior years. Ask yourself:

- Does this subject lead somewhere you actually want to go, such as a particular course or career?
- Will accelerating this subject affect your other subject choices or timetable?
- Do you have support at home and school to manage the extra workload?
- What happens if you decide partway through that it isn't working out?

Getting clear answers to these questions before you commit could save a lot of stress later on.

How acceleration affects your ATAR

One of the biggest questions parents and students ask is whether a subject completed early still counts towards the ATAR later on. The good news is that in most of Australia, it does. Each state and territory has its own tertiary admissions body, and most of them allow results from an accelerated subject to count fully, in the same way as a subject completed in year 12.

- **New South Wales:** Your ATAR is based on an aggregate of scaled marks gathered over a rolling five-year period, so a course completed early counts the same as one finished in year 12. Details are available from the [Universities Admissions Centre \(UAC\)](#).
- **Victoria:** VCE study scores are scaled in the year they're completed, and scores from earlier years contribute to the ATAR the same way as scores from your final year. See the [VTAC ATAR and Scaling Guide](#), the example of Valerie below:
- **Queensland:** The Queensland system specifically allows for accelerated students, saving scaled results from subjects completed before year 12 and carrying them forward within a five-year period. More detail is available from [QTAC](#).
- **Western Australia:** Scaled scores can be also used from up to a five-year period, meaning an ATAR course completed early still counts. See [TISC's guide to the ATAR](#).
- **South Australia and the Northern Territory:** SATAC calculates ATARs in both, any Stage 2 level subjects completed early will contribute to your final aggregate, as long as they fall within the relevant currency period. Details are on the [SATAC website](#) and [SATAC's Tertiary Entrance Booklet 2027-2029](#) states "90 credits of TAS (Tertiary Admissions Subjects) must be completed in a maximum of three attempts which can be in non-consecutive years".
- **Australian Capital Territory:** Both year 11 and year 12 results count towards the ATAR, not just your final year, so results from an accelerated subject aren't discounted for being completed early. Beginning and Continuing Languages, Mathematical Applications, and Mathematical Methods subjects aren't eligible for Early Access. See the [BSSS guide to scaling and the ATAR](#).
- **Tasmania:** Up until 2025 (and things can change so check with your school or TASC directly) any Year 10 results **do not count towards your ATAR**. [TASC calculates your Tertiary Entrance](#) score from your best results across two years of senior secondary study only, even if a course is completed early through acceleration. This means accelerating into a year 11 or 12 course while you're still officially in an earlier year level may still count, but studying senior content while officially in year 10 will not contribute to

your final ATAR. If you're in Tasmania and considering acceleration, it's worth checking directly with [TASC](#) or your school about how your specific pathway will be treated. Because rules are often reviewed and can change, it's always worth confirming the current details with your school and your state's admissions body before making any decisions final.

What if your school doesn't offer the subject?

Occasionally, if a subject you want to accelerate into isn't available at your school at all, particularly in smaller or regional schools, or there's a timetabling conflict; this doesn't necessarily mean you're out of options. [Distance education schools and virtual schools](#) may be an option worth exploring, they might be able to help you access subjects your own school can't offer. Letting you stay enrolled at your regular school while studying one or two extra subjects online. If this sounds like something that could work for you, ask your careers advisor or year coordinator whether your school has a partnership with one of these programs, or approach them directly for more information.

Rules vary across Australia

Because education is managed differently in each state and territory, the process for accelerating a subject depends on where you go to school. Here are the relevant education authorities to check for more detail:

Your school will also have its own internal process, so these links are a good starting point before you have that conversation with your careers advisor or year coordinator.

A note for students in New Zealand

Acceleration is also available in New Zealand schools, and the decision usually sits with your school in consultation with your family. If a subject or learning opportunity isn't available at your school, you may be able to enrol in extra courses through [Te Kura](#), New Zealand's distance learning school, alongside your regular enrolment. This is known as dual tuition. You can find out more through the [Ministry of Education's guidance on learning opportunities for gifted children and young people](#) and [NZQA's subject resources](#).

Extending your learning in other ways

Some universities run accelerated/extension, or university at school programs that let capable senior secondary students study a first-year university subject alongside their normal school timetable. These are usually aimed at students in the final year or two of school, and results can sometimes count towards your final results or give you a head start if you go on to study at that university.

If you complete some subjects early due to accelerated learning, you could also be eligible to do more university at school courses and gain credits towards your university entry or first year studies. These programs are different to accelerated subjects through your state/territory's education body, so always make sure to read all of the conditions and speak with your school before applying for these in addition to, or instead of, accelerated subjects.

Ready to explore your subject options?

Subject acceleration can be a great opportunity for the right student, but it's just one of many pathways worth exploring as you plan your studies. Before you make any decisions, have a chat with your school's careers advisor about what's genuinely right for you, not just what's available. Banking, Tax

Do you need to file a tax return as a young worker?

The information in this article relates to the 2025–26 financial year (1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026) and reflects current [Australian Taxation Office \(ATO\)](#) guidelines. The lodgement window is open now, with a deadline of 31 October 2026. Tax rules can change, so it's always worth checking the ATO's website directly if you're unsure about your specific situation.

What is a tax return?

A tax return is a form you lodge with the [ATO](#) that summarises how much you earned during the financial year and how much tax was taken out of your pay. The ATO uses that information to work out whether you've paid the right amount of tax over the course of the year.

The financial year runs from 1 July to 30 June, so the 2025–26 return covers everything you earned between 1 July 2025 and 30 June 2026. The return is how the ATO reconciles what was collected throughout the year with what you actually owed, and in many cases for young workers, that reconciliation results in a refund.

You might actually be owed money

When you start a job, your employer withholds tax from each pay and sends it to the ATO on your behalf through a system called PAYG withholding. The amount withheld is calculated based on an estimate of what you'll earn over a full year. But if you only worked part of the year, picked up shifts casually, or earned less than expected, you may have had more tax withheld than you actually owed.

Lodging a return is how you claim that money back. The ATO calculates the difference between what was withheld and what you actually owed, and if you overpaid, you get a refund. This applies even if your total income for the year was below the tax-free threshold of [\\$18,200](#), because tax can still be withheld from your pay regardless of what you ended up earning over the full year.

If you worked a part-time job for most of the year but your hours dropped significantly toward the end, there's a good chance your employer was withholding tax based on a higher projected income than you actually ended up with. For a lot of casual and part-time workers, getting that difference back is one of the more practical reasons to lodge even when it feels optional.

Do you need to lodge one?

Whether you need to lodge depends on your individual circumstances. The general rule is that if your taxable income exceeded \$18,200 for the year, you're required to lodge. But the more common trigger for young workers in part-time or casual roles is simpler: if any tax was withheld

from your pay during the year, you'll likely need to lodge so the ATO can work out whether a refund is owed or your obligations are settled.

If you're under 18

There's a provision worth knowing about if you were under 18 on 30 June 2026. If your income came from a regular job as salary or wages, the standard \$18,200 threshold applies. But if any of your income during 2025–26 came from sources other than salary or wages, such as interest on savings, dividends, or payments not classified as employment income, the lodgement threshold drops to just \$416. This can catch young people off guard, particularly those who have money in savings accounts earning interest or who've received payments outside of a standard employment arrangement. You can check [Reason 4 of the ATO's 2026 lodgement guide](#) to see exactly how it applies to your situation.

Rather than trying to work all of this out on your own, the ATO has a [free online tool](#) that walks you through a series of questions and gives you a clear answer based on your circumstances. It now covers the 2025–26 year and is the most reliable way to check, since it accounts for the various combinations of income type, age, and residency that affect the result.

If you work out that you don't need to lodge, you still need to let the ATO know by submitting a [non-lodgement advice](#). This tells the ATO you've checked and confirmed a return isn't required. Skipping this step can result in the ATO assuming you simply missed your return and following up accordingly.

What about work through apps?

If you earn money doing deliveries, rideshare driving, odd jobs through apps like Airtasker, or any kind of freelance work, the tax rules are different to a standard job. There's no employer automatically taking tax out of your payments, so the full amount lands in your account and the responsibility for sorting out what you owe sits with you.

Whatever you earn this way needs to be reported as income in your tax return. That applies regardless of how often you did it or how much you made, and it includes income earned alongside a regular job. If you did a few months of delivery shifts on the side of your part-time work, both sources of income need to appear in your return.

It's also worth knowing that many major apps now report what their workers earn directly to the ATO. That means if you've been doing shifts through one of the bigger platforms, the ATO may already have some visibility of that income. Leaving it out of your return is more likely to create a problem than avoid one. If your situation involves several different income sources and you're not sure how to handle it, a registered tax agent can help sort it out.

How to lodge

The most accessible option for most young people is [myTax](#), the ATO's free online lodgement tool accessed through a myGov account. The myTax 2026 return is open now. Before you start, it helps to have a few things on hand: your tax file number, your income statement from your employer (available through myGov once your employer has finalised their reporting), and details of any other income received during the year. For most straightforward situations involving a single employer and simple income, the process is guided and relatively quick, with most returns processed within two weeks.

The ATO pre-fills a lot of information for you once it's been reported, including salary and wages data, bank interest, and government payments. Waiting a few weeks before lodging can mean more of that information is already filled in, which reduces the chance of needing to make corrections later.

The deadline for lodging your own return is **31 October 2026**. If you're expecting a refund, there's no reason to wait. If your situation is more complex or you'd prefer help, a registered tax agent can lodge on your behalf, though they do charge a fee. To access their extended

lodgement program, which allows additional time beyond October, you'll need to engage one before the deadline.

What happens if you don't?

If you're required to lodge and don't, the ATO can issue a [failure to lodge penalty](#). It accumulates at a rate of one penalty unit for every 28 days the return is overdue, up to a maximum of five penalty units. The ATO generally issues a warning before applying a formal penalty, so you'd typically receive a notice to lodge first. But waiting for that notice isn't a useful approach. The longer a return stays outstanding, the more complicated things tend to get. Missing the deadline on a prior year return can also push forward your deadline for the current year, so falling behind has a way of compounding. If you've missed a return from a previous year, lodging it as soon as possible is the right move. The ATO does take into account whether you acted promptly when deciding whether to apply or reduce a penalty, so getting on top of it quickly matters.

Tax is manageable once you know where you stand

The main thing that makes tax feel overwhelming for young workers is not knowing what applies to them. Once you understand your obligations, the process is straightforward for most people in simple employment situations, and for many casual or part-time workers, it means money back.

3 Fulfilling Careers Working with Guide Dogs

A guide dog spends around ten months with a volunteer puppy raiser before starting the structured training that prepares them for real work. Turning that puppy into a working guide, and then matching them with the right person, involves several distinct careers, each combining hands-on dog work with directly supporting the client on the other end of the lead. Here's a look at three worth exploring.

Guide Dog Trainer

When a puppy returns from their time with a volunteer raiser, a Guide Dog Trainer takes over for the most intensive stage of their development. The first one to two weeks are spent on a temperament assessment, checking how each dog reacts to distractions like other animals, food, or crowded spaces. From there, a Trainer runs an intensive program over several months, teaching skills such as walking a straight line to a kerb, keeping extra space on their right to protect a future handler from obstacles, and navigating around obstacles altogether. Everything is taught through positive reinforcement, with the pace adjusted to suit each dog's personality. It's a physically demanding job, with plenty of walking, bending, and time spent outdoors regardless of the weather. Most people enter through an 18-month to two-year cadetship rather than a university degree, and patience matters just as much as a solid read on canine body language.

Guide Dog Mobility Instructor

Once a dog is ready, someone still has to match them to the right person and teach the pair to actually work as a team, and that's where a Guide Dog Mobility Instructor comes in. Matching is based on a client's personality, mobility needs, and lifestyle, not just availability. Initial training with a client usually runs three to six weeks, followed by a few more days of support once

they're back in their own home and routine, since a dog that performs well at a training centre still needs to adjust to a person's actual daily life.

Qualifying takes three to four years and combines an animal handling qualification with postgraduate study in orientation and mobility, the discipline behind helping someone travel safely through their environment. Because training has to fit around a client's life rather than the other way around, evening, weekend, and holiday work is common.

Puppy Development Advisor

Before a puppy ever reaches a Guide Dog Trainer, they spend their first year or so living with a volunteer Puppy Raiser, and a Puppy Development Advisor is the person guiding that entire stage. Advisors recruit and screen volunteers, run home assessments to check a household is a good fit, and then support each Puppy Raiser through weekly and later fortnightly training sessions, teaching them how to build a puppy's confidence, house manners, and social skills from the ground up. It's hands-on with dogs too, since Advisors track each puppy's temperament and development over time and flag anything that might affect their progress later on.

The role tends to draw on many of the same skills as a Guide Dog Trainer, including a solid grasp of positive reinforcement and the ability to read early signs of behavioural change, alongside the communication skills needed to guide volunteers who often have no prior dog training experience. It's a good fit for someone who enjoys teaching people as much as working with animals.

What you'd need to get started

None of these roles usually require a specific university degree to enter as a trainee. Cadetship and instructor programs are typically structured as paid, on-the-job training, which means you're learning the practical side of the work from day one rather than completing years of study beforehand.

That said, a background in animal science, nursing, psychology, or occupational therapy can work in your favour when you apply, since each builds skills that overlap with the work in different ways. Animal science gives you a head start on reading behaviour, while nursing, psychology, and occupational therapy all build the kind of people skills that matter once you're working directly with clients or families.

Beyond your background, there's a set of baseline requirements you'll need to meet regardless of which of these roles you're aiming for:

- Being 18 years of age or older
- Holding a valid driver's licence
- Having a good level of physical fitness
- Having good vision and hearing
- Having a high degree of empathy

The driver's licence and fitness requirements exist because the work itself demands them.

Trainers and Instructors travel between training centres, client homes, and public locations regularly, and a lot of the day-to-day work involves walking, bending, and being on your feet for extended periods. Empathy matters just as much, since even the dog-focused roles are ultimately working toward someone else's independence.

Background checks and clearances

Because this work involves vulnerable people as well as animals, the screening process is thorough, and it starts before you're even offered a position. Most guide dog organisations require a National Police Check as a standard part of recruitment, and if you've lived overseas for more than 12 months in the last 10 years, an International Police Check as well.

Once you're employed, the checks don't stop there. You'll usually need to hold a current Working With Children Check, given how often these roles bring you into contact with the public, including volunteers, families, and clients of all ages. Depending on the specific role and state that you live in, you may also need an additional check under the NDIS Worker Screening Checks or equivalent program.

These clearances aren't a one-off formality completed during recruitment and then forgotten.

They're generally maintained for as long as you're employed in the role, which means renewing them periodically as part of the job rather than ticking a box once and moving on.

Study Tips

10 ways to study that aren't boring

Very few people would list studying as their favourite way to spend an afternoon. At some point, the hard yards still need to happen. The good news is that studying doesn't have to mean sitting at a desk with a textbook for hours on end.

There are plenty of ways to learn that are more engaging. Some get you out of the house, and a few barely feel like study at all once you're into them. Here are our top 10 ways to study that aren't boring.

Join homework clubs or study groups

Motivation doesn't show up on demand. Some days it's genuinely hard to sit down and study alone. Joining a homework club or study group solves part of that problem simply by putting you in a room with other people working toward the same goal, with a set time and place and a bit of friendly accountability that's harder to find on your own.

Study groups also work well because hearing how someone else has approached a topic, or where they got stuck, often highlights gaps in your own understanding. It's a different kind of learning to sitting with your own notes, and for a lot of people, it's more enjoyable too.

If your school doesn't already run one for your subject, ask a teacher whether they'd support setting one up, or put the idea to a few classmates who seem to be in the same boat. Even an informal weekly catch-up at a library or someone's kitchen table can work just as well as a structured program, as long as everyone shows up ready to work.

Watch documentaries

If a good documentary is already your idea of a night in, there's no reason that can't double as study time. Searching out documentaries related to your subjects builds real-world context around what you're learning, and it tends to stick better than a page of notes because you're watching events unfold rather than reading a summary of them.

Fictional films can work just as well:

- A novel you're studying in English Literature might have a film adaptation
- A historical event you're covering might have been dramatised on screen
- A concept in science or geography, like climate systems or space exploration, might be the subject of a well-made documentary

Each of these can bring the material to life in a way that's hard to get from a textbook alone. The one thing to watch for is being honest with yourself about what actually counts. Sitting through any random show and calling it study won't hold up, so stick to content that's relevant and reliable.

Deep dive online

According to eSafety Commissioner research, Australian teens spend an average of 14.4 hours online each week. That's a significant chunk of time, and at least some of it could be redirected toward something useful, including:

- Video explainers on topics you're studying
- Practice exam questions
- Subject-specific forums where other students have worked through similar problems
- Recorded lectures or walkthroughs from other schools or open courses

Any of these can make a concept click faster than working through it alone. The obvious catch is staying on track. Scrolling social media or messaging your mates might happen on the same device, but it's not the same thing as productive study time. Setting a specific goal before you open the laptop, like finding three practice questions on a topic, can help keep the session focused.

Do projects or presentations

Putting together a project or presentation teaches you more than just the content you're researching. Along the way, you're also building creativity, analytical thinking, problem-solving, and communication, plus teamwork if it's a group task. All of these carry well beyond the subject you're studying.

If these kinds of tasks motivate you more than straight revision, there's no reason to wait for a school assignment to do one. You could write a blog, film a short video, draft a letter to a local politician or council, or design an infographic. Competitions can add an extra layer of challenge too, giving you a concrete goal to work toward and sometimes a prize at the end of it.

Go places

Not all learning happens in a classroom. Museums, libraries, galleries, and theatres are all designed with learning in mind, and educational talks or career events can offer a different angle on a subject than a textbook ever could.

If politics interests you, a tour of a government building or Parliament House puts the theory into a real setting. If law is more your area, sitting in on a public court hearing shows you how it actually plays out in practice. Experiencing something first-hand tends to make it stick in a way that reading about it doesn't.

Sign up for things that interest you

Workshops, clubs, camps, short courses, microcredentials, and holiday programs are all worth looking into if a topic genuinely interests you. Some come with a cost, but plenty are free, and the return in terms of what you learn and who you meet can be well worth the time.

Finding them usually just takes a bit of digging:

- Council websites
- Social media
- Event platforms like Eventbrite or Humanitix
- Your teachers and parents
- The local paper or noticeboards at your nearest shopping centre

Our own events calendar is worth a look too, if you'd rather not search around for opportunities yourself.

Make it a game

Plenty of apps now exist purely to make learning feel more like a game, turning flashcards and quizzes into something closer to a challenge with levels and streaks than a study task. With so many free options available, there's little reason not to try a few and see what sticks.

If you'd rather step away from a screen altogether, board games and card games can do a similar job. Strategy games call on planning and logical thinking, while word and trivia games build recall and general knowledge without ever feeling like revision. Depending on what you choose, games can sharpen memory, focus, and reasoning, build confidence, and improve how quickly you process new information, all while giving you a legitimate reason to spend time with family or friends rather than studying alone.

Work smarter

Studying for hours in one sitting after a full day at school isn't appealing to most people, and it isn't always the most effective approach either. Spreading study out into smaller sessions can add up over a week without ever feeling like a big chunk of your day has disappeared. Time on the bus, a free period at school, or a few spare minutes while waiting for an appointment can all work.

Short, regular sessions spaced out over several days also tend to help information stick better than one long cram, since you're revisiting the material instead of only seeing it once. The upside isn't just efficiency either. Studying in shorter bursts usually leaves more of your day free for the things you'd rather be doing, whether that's sport, time with friends, or simply switching off.

Teach others

If you've got a solid handle on a subject, tutoring other students is a way to earn some pocket money while reinforcing everything you already know. Explaining a concept to someone else forces you to organise your thinking clearly, and it's often the fastest way to find out where your own understanding has gaps.

Formal tutoring isn't the only option either. Sitting a parent, sibling, or friend down and talking them through something you've learned works just as well, and it costs nothing to try.

Gain skills

If a test is close, your time is probably better spent revising for it directly. But if you've got a bit of room to move, even just 10 minutes a day, picking up a new skill on the side can be worthwhile:

- Touch typing pays off well beyond school, since almost every subject and job eventually involves typing something up
- Coding, a new language, or learning to cook are all reasonable places to start
- None of them require a big time commitment to begin seeing progress

Picking up something new outside your usual subjects can be a welcome change of pace from exam-focused study.

Work Experience

Work experience ideas for creative students

Finding work experience in the creative industries can be tricky. You probably won't find as many structured placements as you would in other fields, since a lot of creative work happens through small studios, freelancers, and informal networks rather than large organisations with set programs.

That doesn't mean there are no opportunities available, there are still plenty of ways to build real skills and get genuine experience under your belt, even if it takes a bit more initiative to find them. Here are a few work experience ideas for creative students.

Help out at your local gallery

Galleries and museums often need extra hands, especially when they're setting up new exhibitions or running events. Volunteering at a gallery could involve:

- Setting up and arranging new exhibitions
- Welcoming and chatting with visitors
- Helping promote events on social media
- Learning about different art styles and artists directly from curators and staff
- Seeing how a gallery actually operates behind the scenes, from logistics to programming

Smaller, local galleries are usually the easiest place to start, since they tend to run on a small team and are often glad to have an extra pair of hands. Larger institutions can be worth approaching too, but expect a more formal application process and less flexibility around when you can help out.

Share your writing with the world

If writing is where your interest lies, there are plenty of places to showcase your work beyond the classroom.

- Magazines and literary journals that accept student submissions
- Local community newspapers, which are often short on content and open to contributions
- Online writing platforms and blogs
- Writing competitions, which double as a way to get feedback on your work
- Starting your own blog or newsletter, where you set the direction entirely

Submitting work for publication also teaches you something a school assignment doesn't, since you're writing for an actual audience and often working to an editor's feedback or a publication's specific style.

Discover theatre behind the scenes

Theatre isn't only about acting. A huge number of roles go into bringing a show to life, and most community theatres rely on volunteers to fill them. These roles can include:

- Lighting and sound design
- Costume and makeup
- Set building and design
- Stage management, coordinating everything that happens before and during a show
- Front of house duties, like ushering and ticketing

Technical and backstage roles in particular are worth considering if performing itself isn't your focus, since they build hands-on skills in areas like design, coordination, and problem-solving under pressure, all of which apply well beyond theatre.

Build your photography portfolio

A good eye and a camera, even one on a phone, is often enough to start building a photography portfolio. From there, you could:

- Photograph school events like sports days or formals
- Take photos at local community events or markets
- Shadow a professional photographer for a day to see how a shoot is actually run
- Enter photography competitions to test your work against a wider field
- Create a themed photo series exploring a single idea or location in depth

If you're photographing people in public, always get their permission first, and be upfront about what the photos might be used for. Editing your shots afterwards is worth practising too, since most professional photography work involves as much time behind a screen as behind a lens.

What's next?

Keep examples of everything you create, whether it's paid work or not. A folder of your best pieces, built up over time, is worth more to a future employer than a list of places you've volunteered. It's also worth keeping a running note of the skills you pick up along the way, since these are easy to forget by the time you sit down to update your resume.

Job Spotlights

How to become a Construction Manager

Construction Managers oversee the delivery of building and infrastructure projects, coordinating trades, materials, timelines, and budgets from the first day on site through to handover. They are the central point of accountability on a project, responsible for making sure everything comes together safely, on time, and within budget.

If you're a natural organiser who thrives in fast-moving environments, enjoys working with a wide range of people, and wants to see real, tangible results from your work, this career could suit you well.

What skills do I need as a Construction Manager?

- Organisational & planning ability
- Leadership under pressure
- Clear communicator
- Budget & schedule management
- Problem-solver
- Safety awareness
- Decision-making confidence
- Collaborative & team-focused

What do Construction Managers do?

Before construction begins, you're already deep in the planning process. You'll review project plans and specifications, develop detailed schedules, allocate resources, and identify potential risks before they become problems on site. You'll work through contracts with subcontractors, coordinate with engineers and architects, and make sure everyone involved understands what's expected of them and when.

On site, you're responsible for keeping everything moving. You'll monitor progress against the schedule, manage day-to-day issues as they arise, enforce safety requirements, and liaise constantly with trades, clients, and project stakeholders. When problems occur, whether that's a delayed material delivery, a design change, or a subcontractor issue, you're the one who needs to find a solution quickly and keep the project on track.

Away from the immediate pressure of delivery, you'll manage the financial side of projects, tracking costs, approving variations, and reporting to clients on progress. As projects wind down, you'll coordinate inspections, manage defects, and prepare for handover. Some Construction Managers develop expertise in particular project types such as commercial, residential, or civil infrastructure, or move into specialist areas like heritage construction or sustainable building.

What kind of lifestyle could I expect?

Construction Managers work for building and construction companies, civil contractors, government infrastructure agencies, and property developers. Some work for large national firms delivering major projects, while others work with smaller regional builders on a broader mix of work. The industry spans residential housing, commercial development, civil infrastructure, and public works, so the type of employer and project can vary considerably.

Hours are above average, particularly during active construction phases when deadlines are pressing and multiple trades need to be coordinated simultaneously. The work is site-based, which means early starts are common and the environment changes as projects move through different stages. Flexibility is limited compared to office-based roles, and travel between sites is a regular part of the job for managers overseeing multiple projects.

The physical demands are moderate — you'll spend time on your feet moving around sites, though the role is primarily one of coordination and oversight rather than manual labour.

Personal protective equipment is standard. Salaries are above average, and the sector has strong ongoing demand driven by infrastructure investment and continued residential and commercial development.

How to become a Construction Manager

- **Gain relevant qualifications:** Most Construction Managers enter the field through a degree in construction management, civil engineering, or a related discipline. Vocational qualifications in building and construction can also provide a pathway, particularly when combined with trade experience. Check what programs are available in your area, as entry requirements and pathways vary.
- **Start on site:** Practical experience is essential in this industry. Many people begin in site administration, trade, or labouring roles, building their understanding of how construction actually works before moving into coordination and management responsibilities. Cadet and graduate programs with construction firms are another common entry point.
- **Develop technical and commercial skills:** Construction management requires you to understand contracts, building codes, safety legislation, and project scheduling tools. Build this knowledge early, whether through your studies or on the job, as it underpins almost every decision you'll make in the role.
- **Build your site reputation:** The construction industry is relationship-driven. Reliability, clear communication, and the ability to keep a team working well under pressure are qualities that get noticed. Strong site managers tend to progress through demonstrated performance as much as formal qualifications.

From here, you could take on larger and more complex projects, move into senior or executive project management roles, specialise in a particular construction sector, transition into development or project advisory work, or establish your own contracting business.

What can I do right now?

If you're in high school and interested in working as a Construction Manager, here are some practical steps:

- Look into school-based vocational programs in construction and the built environment, which can give you hands-on experience and a head start on industry qualifications before you finish school
- Visit construction sites with a parent or guardian to observe how projects are organised and ask about the range of roles involved, from trades to site management
- Develop your practical skills by taking on hands-on projects at home or school that involve planning, problem-solving, and working with materials
